

1. Seasoning the Stove

Seasoning, also known as curing, is the process of heating the stove to help set the paint and remove any residual manufacturing oils. Follow these steps to season your wood stove:

- 1. **Open Windows and Doors**: Ensure proper ventilation in the room to allow any fumes to escape.
- 2. **Start Small Fires**: Build several small, low-intensity fires using small pieces of dry kindling. Let each fire burn out completely.

Regular cleaning is essential for the proper operation of your wood stove. Clean out ash and debris regularly and inspect the firebricks for damage. Check your spark arrestor in your Rain Cap regularly to make sure it's not becoming plugged with ash.

6. Tips for Efficient Wood Burning

- Burn only seasoned wood to minimize creosote buildup.
- Use smaller, well-seasoned pieces of wood for more efficient burning.
- Avoid burning treated or painted wood, as it can release harmful chemicals.
